### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The purpose of this Report is to provide an update on the Dumfries and Galloway Alcohol and Drugs Partnership.

### 3. Background

- 3.1 Dumfries and Galloway Alcohol and Drugs Partnership is a multi-agency partnership consisting of representatives from statutory organisations including Health, Social Work, Housing, Police, Prison, Procurator Fiscal Service, Public Protection, Community Justice, Third Sector Interface and Elected Members. The ADP is responsible for developing local strategies that aim to prevent and reduce the harmful effects of alcohol and drugs in our communities and commission services that provide treatment and recovery for people with drug and alcohol problems.
- 3.2 ADP is funded by the Scottish Government, together with further funding commitments from NHS Dumfries and Galloway and Dumfries and Galloway Council.
- 3.3 The ADP Annual Report requires to be signed off by the Community Planning Partnership before being submitted to the Scottish Government, and the ADP also contributes to the Single Outcome Agreement/Local Outcomes Improvement Plan. It therefore reports every year to the Community Planning Executive Group and through it to the Dumfries and Galloway Strategic Partnership.
- 3.4 National and Local Priorities:

### 3.5 The ADP is required to:

- Comply with the demands of the Scottish Drug Misuse Database (SDMD), the Drug and Alcohol Treatment Times Database (DATWTD).
- Comply with the Alcohol Brief Interventions (ABI).
- Comply with the Drug and Alcohol Waiting Times
- Develop processes to ensure that patients, service users, their families and carers are embedded within the commissioning, delivery and ongoing review of services.
- Continue the development of a Recovery Orientated System of Care (ROSC) within the Dumfries and Galloway Recovery Plan.
- Develop and implement a comprehensive Workforce Development Plan.
- Develop a Performance Management Framework.
- Develop a local Drugs Death Prevention Strategy which will include a commitment to annual increases in the reach and coverage of the National Naloxone Programme.
- Development of data collection systems in respect of the use of Opiate Replacement Therapy in Dumfries and Galloway.
- Ongoing review of Shared Care for people with drug problems.
- Implementation of the local NPS (New Psychoactive Substances) Strategy and compliance with national initiatives concerning NPS.
- Development of effective throughcare arrangements for prisoners affected by drug and alcohol use.

## 4. Main Body of the Report

### 4.1 Award of ADP – Funding 2017-18

4.2 Two independent needs assessments have been conducted by McMillan Rome (**Appendix 1**); one for adult service users and one for children and young people.

4.3 A quality survey was also conducted by the Scottish Drugs Forum examining service delivery.

### 4.4 Agreements

4.5 Following the needs assessment and consultation with staff and service users across all ADP commissioned adult and children's services, the ADP have agreed the priority areas for service delivery these are as follows:

- To provide treatment and recovery services to adults and children & young people with drug and alcohol problems.
- To provide support to young carers who are affected by parental drug and alcohol problems.
- Contracts have been awarded to those Third Sector organisations which meet the agreed priority areas.

### 4.6 Future Development

- 4.7 ADP will review its membership, remit and reporting arrangements during 2017. ADP will also develop a strategy for 2017-2020, supported by a delivery plan to ensure national and local priorities are delivered. A commissioning strategy will be produced which will include using coproduction methods to determine future needs of service users.
